### A Profile of Post-Secondary Students in Alberta

Child and Youth Data Laboratory (CYDL) Longitudinal Project

#### Introduction

This report is an overview of the experiences of students enrolled in publicly-funded post-secondary institutions in Alberta (aged 18 to 25 years) from the 2005/06 to 2010/11 school years.

Two main indicators of post-secondary involvement—enrolment status (full- and part-time status) and credential type (Master's/PhD, Bachelor/Applied, Certificate/Diploma, University transfer, No credential) are profiled by a range socio-demographic characteristics, including region, gender, age, Aboriginal status, educational achievement, and socio-economic status. This report considers apprentices that were enrolled only in NAIT or SAIT.

Providing new data on post-secondary students, the report also profiles enrolment status and credential type by a range of government service use patterns, including health service use, justice system involvement, income support use and post-secondary loan support.



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## **Key Findings**

Over the study period:

- Almost one-third (about 120,000 to 130,000) of individuals (aged 18 to 25) living in Alberta were enrolled in publicly-funded post-secondary institutions.
- There was a greater representation of female than male part-time and full-time students.
- About 3% of students enrolled as full-time students identified as Aboriginal; a similar percentage of self-reported Aboriginal students were represented in the part-time student population.
- Post-secondary students were more likely than non–students to be meeting or exceeding educational expectations at grade 12.
- Part-time students were more likely to use mental health services than full-time students and non-students.
- Students were less likely to be high cost health service users than individuals not enrolled in post-secondary studies.
- Students enrolled in post-secondary studies but not pursuing a credential ("no credential" students) were more likely than other students to be mental health and high cost health service users. They were also more likely to have offence charges, be receiving income support and be post-secondary student loan recipients.

#### **Background literature**

Providing a context for the current report, this section highlights select literature focusing on post-secondary students in Alberta and Canada.

Many benefits are associated with obtaining a post-secondary education. In addition to earning a higher than average income, individuals with a post-secondary credential can anticipate securing advanced employment opportunities<sup>1</sup>. Over the next several years, about two-thirds of all jobs opening in Canada will require a post-secondary education<sup>1</sup>. Post-secondary credential earners are more likely than non-credential earners to experience greater levels of job satisfaction and long-term employment <sup>1</sup>.

According to the 2014/15 *Campus Alberta Planning Resource* manual, rates of post-secondary participation are lower in Alberta compared to other Canadian provinces. In 2014-15, the rate of participation among Albertans between 17 and 24 years was 17% compared to the Canadian average at 24%<sup>2</sup>. Participation rates will likely increase with the recent downward trend in Alberta's economy (Alberta Advanced Education, 2015:3).

The vast majority of students (82%) have been typically between the ages of 18 and 34 years.<sup>2</sup> In 2014-15, there were more females than males enrolled in Alberta's post-secondary institutions (52.9% versus 47.1%, respectively). In that same year, there was a higher proportion of Aboriginal female students (62.8%) than non-Aboriginal female students (52.9%)<sup>2</sup>. Among males, there was a greater proportion of non-Aboriginal males than Aboriginal males (47.1% versus 37.2%, respectively).<sup>2</sup>

The participation rate of Aboriginal students has increased over time, stabilizing at about 4% of the total population of Alberta's post-secondary students. In general, however, Aboriginal individuals are less likely to be enrolled in post-secondary institutions than non-Aboriginal individuals (50% versus 63%, respectively). In addition, the proportion of non-Aboriginal students completing a university degree was more than double that of Aboriginal students in 2014-15 (28% versus 11%, respectively)<sup>2</sup>


A post-secondary education is associated with positive health and well-being outcomes.¹ However, the rise of mental health service use among students during their post-secondary training has become a growing concern³,⁴. Alberta's major universities have responded to the need for increased funding toward timely and exhaustive mental health supports for students troubled by mental health issues³.

The service use patterns of post-secondary students in other areas are less well documented. This report provides new data on government program involvement for post-secondary students, including health service use, income support, justice system involvement, and post-secondary loan support.

#### Enrolment time trend (Table 1)

This graph represents the percentage of individuals aged 18 to 25 enrolled in publicly-funded post-secondary institutions in Alberta between 2005/06 to 2010/11.

 In each year of the study period, close to 30% of individuals were in the post-secondary education system (approximately, 120,000 to 130,000 individuals over the study period).  $Percentage\ of\ individuals\ aged\ 18\ to\ 25\ enrolled\ in\ a\ publicly-funded\ Alberta$  post-secondary institution over time

- Over the study period, one-half of postsecondary students were enrolled in university institutions (e.g., University of Alberta). 16% were enrolled in community colleges (e.g., NorQuest, Bow Valley).
- This pattern remained relatively stable between the 2005/06 and 2010/11 school year periods.

### Region (Table 3)


This map represents the percentage of students out of the total population (18 to 25 years) within each Albertan region in 2010/11 (see page 33 for list of post-secondary regions).

- In 2010/11, out of the total population of 18 to 25 year olds in Edmonton, over one-quarter of individuals were post-secondary students. A similar percentage of students were in Calgary.
- Compared to southern regions, a smaller proportion of individuals in northern regions were enrolled in post-secondary institutions.

#### Gender by Enrolment Status (Table 5)

This analysis represents the percentage of female students (18 to 25 years) enrolled either full- or part-time in a post-secondary institution between 2005/06 and 2010/11. See table 5 (p.14) for numbers and percentages of male students by credential type.

- Over the study period, the gender distribution of post-secondary students remained stable, with a greater proportion of females enrolled in a postsecondary institution.
- Over the study period, there was a greater proportion of both full- and part-time female students than male students.

#### Age by Enrolment Status (Table 6)


This analysis represents the percentage of students enrolled either full- or part-time in a post-secondary institution in 2010/11 by age groups.

- Among full-time students, over 80% were between 18 and 22 years in each year of the study period.
- Among part-time students, a greater proportion were represented in the 18 and 22 year age group (approximately two-thirds of the parttime population) in each year of the study period.


# **Aboriginal Status by Enrolment Status** (Table 7)

 Over the study period, about 3% of students enrolled as full-time students self-identified as Aboriginal; a similar percentage of self-declared Aboriginal students were represented in the part-time student population.


# Educational Achievement at Grade 12 by Enrolment Status (Table 8)

- In each study year, a greater proportion (almost 90%) of Albertan post-secondary students were meeting or exceeding expectations at grade 12 compared to same age Albertans not enrolled (about 70%) in post-secondary institutions.
- Over the study period, proportions of students exceeding or meeting expectations at grade 12 were similar between full- and part-time students.

# **High Cost Health Service Use by Enrolment Status** (Table 9)



- A greater proportion of part-time students compared to full-time students were high cost health service users over the study period. Proportions remained relatively stable over the study period.
- Over the study period, non-students had higher rates of high cost health service use than students.

# Mental Health Service Use by Enrolment Status (Table 10)

- A greater proportion of part-time students (9.4% in 2010/11) compared to full-time students (6.4% in 2010/11) had received mental health services over the study period. Proportions remained relatively stable over the study period.
- Proportions of mental health service use were also higher for part-time students (9.4% in 2010/11) compared to non-students (7.9% in 2010/11) across the study period.

Percentage of students aged 18 to 25 who used a mental health service by enrolment status over time




#### Gender by Credential Type (Table 13)

This analysis represents the percentage of female students by credential type over the study period.

• Over the study period, females were more likely than males to be represented in the university transfer (~60%, females; ~40%, males) and "no credential" categories (~60%, females; ~40%, males) See table 13 (p.21) for numbers and percentages of male students by credential type.


#### Age by Credential Type (Table 14)

- Across the study period, the vast majority of students enrolled in Bachelor/Applied, Certificate/ Diploma and University Transfer programs were between 18 and 22 years (figure shows 2010/11 proportions).
- As expected, students enrolled in Master's/
  Doctoral programs were older, with over three
  quarters between 23 and 25 years across the study
  period. University transfer students were the least
  likely to be represented in this older age group.
  Age patterns remained stable over the study
  period.

# Aboriginal Status by Credential Type (Table 15 a and b)

- Over the study period, a greater proportion (between 5% and 6%) of Aboriginal students were represented in the "no credential" category compared to their representation in other credential types.
- Over the study period, between 3% and 4% of students enrolled in Certificate/Diploma programs had identified as Aboriginal.


Percentage of students aged 18 to 25 who identified as Aboriginal by credential type over time




# High Cost Health Service Use by Credential Type (Table 16 a and b)

- High cost health service use among "no credential" students was proportionately higher than students in other credential types, but lower than non-students. See Table 9 (p.18) for "not enrolled" numbers and percentages.
- High cost health service users were proportionately lower among students in Master's/Doctoral programs compared to other students.

Percentage of students aged  $18\ \text{to}\ 25\ \text{who}$  were high cost health service users by credential type over time




Percentage of students aged 18 to 25 who used a mental health service by credential type over time




# Mental Health Service Use by Credential Type (Table 17 a and b)

- Mental health service use was most apparent among "no credential" students, hovering at about 10% of students in this category over the study period. This pattern remained consistent over the study period.
- Over the study period, mental health service use was greater among "no credential" (~10%) students compared to non-students (~8%). See Table 10 (p.19) for "not enrolled" numbers and percentages.


#### Socio-economic status (SES) by Credential Type in 2010/11 (Table 18 a and b)












#### In 2010/11:

- Compared to students in other programs, students in Master's/Doctoral programs were the least represented in the lowest socio-economic neighborhoods ( $\sim$ 12%). Because patterns remained relatively stable over the study period, only figures from 2010/11 are shown above.
- Students in "no credential" studies were evenly distributed across the five SES groups.
- Compared to other students, students enrolled in bachelor/applied programs were over-represented in the highest socio-economic neighborhoods (31%).
- Higher proportions of non-post-secondary students were living in the lower socio-economic neighborhoods compared to students. *See table 18 a and b (pages 26-27) for numbers and percentages.*

# **Health Care Registry by Credential Type** (Table 19)


 Compared to other students, students enrolled in Master's/Doctoral and "no credential" programs were the least likely to be registered in Alberta's health care registry.

# **Criminal Offences by Credential Type** (Table 20)


Note that the Bachelor/Applied/Graduate category includes Bachelor, Applied, Master's/Doctoral credential groups.

- Having a criminal offence was not a common occurrence among the postsecondary population, with under 4% of the student population having an offence over the study period.
- Compared to other students, the lowest proportion of students with offences were enrolled in a University Transfer program.

# **Income Support by Credential Type** (Table 21)

- Post-secondary students are infrequent users of the Income Support program.
- Income Support use was highest among "no credential" students across all years (~3%).
- Across the study period, rates of Income Support use were lowest among Bachelor/Applied/Graduate students and university transfer students. Note that due to low numbers, the time trend of university transfer students are not shown in graph. See table 21 (p.30) for numbers and percentages.

# Post-secondary Student Loans by Credential Type (Table 22)

- **Aboriginal** includes self-declarations of Status Indian/First Nations, Non-status Indian/First Nations, Métis, and Inuit identification.
- Age, gender, and postal code (translated into Statistics Canada dissemination areas) were provided for
  each individual by each participating program. In the case of discrepancies between programs, the most
  common value for an indicator was chosen. In the event of two or more most common values, the value
  for the indicator was chosen randomly from the most common values.
- The **Alberta Health Care Registry** (also known as the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan AHCIP) includes all study participants (aged 0 to 30) who are eligible to receive insured hospital and physician services.
- Five **credential types** are considered in this report including: Master's/Doctoral, Bachelor/Applied, Certificate/Diploma, University transfer, and No credential programs. University transfer programs allow students to start a degree-level program in one institution and then transfer to another institution to complete the degree. Students enrolled in a post-secondary institution, but not pursuing a credential are classified as "no credential" students.
- Individuals with **criminal offences** include those (aged 12 or older) charged with offences under various federal statutes.
- Cross-ministry analyses included only study participants who were linked across the relevant programs. This means that not all participants in the project were represented in every analysis. As well, only participants with a value for a given indicator were included in analyses involving that indicator (i.e., missing values were excluded).
- Educational achievement was computed by Alberta Education using age, grade, school type, special education codes, provincial achievement test scores, home education status, number of high school credits earned, number of higher level courses taken, average grade in higher level courses, possession of an Alberta Education certificate or diploma, and Alexander Rutherford scholarship eligibility. Educational achievement was categorized as above, meeting, or below expectations for a student's age and grade. An educational achievement rating was not available for youth in 'other' schools (accredited post-secondary institutions offering high school courses for credit to adults; most youth in these schools were between 18 and 20 years), for home-schooled high school youth with no credits, and for students in grades lower than 3.
- **English as a Second Language** (ESL) students are students (aged 3.5 to 19) who receive whose first language is not English and who are receiving supports to improve their proficiency in English.
- **Enrolment status** refers to post-secondary students enrolled either full time or part time in the school year. Full time students are enrolled in at least 60% of a full course load in at least one session in the academic years. Part time students were enrolled in less than 60% of a full course in all sessions attended for the academic year.
- **High cost health service use:** Cost estimates per type of service across physician visits (general practitioner or specialist), ambulatory care visits (emergency or other ambulatory care), and hospitalizations (by type of service) were obtained from the Canadian Institute for Health Information. Estimated costs per visit were summed across all visits for each individual. High cost health users were those in the top 5% of estimated costs for their age groups and genders.

#### Definitions and notes (continued)

- **Income Support** provides financial assistance to individuals (aged 16 and older) who are unable to meet their basic needs.
- Alberta Education provides the **Kindergarten to Grade 12 educational system** to Albertan students between the ages of 5 and 19 years of age.
- Mental health service was defined by the presence or absence of mental health diagnosis codes (Two or more ICD-9: 290-309.9, 311-314.9, 316, or a single ICD-10CA: F00-F06.9, F09-F69, F84-F99, G31.2, G44.2, R41.0) in Alberta Health and Wellness' databases (Inpatient—Discharge Abstract Database, Ambulatory Care, and Practitioner Payments), or in the Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) or the Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH) information systems. Only Albertans who were registered with the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan for the full fiscal year or who had a mental health service with FSCD or AISH were included. Mental health service use is a proxy for presence of a mental health condition; some youth with mental health conditions may not have accessed mental health services in Alberta during the year, and some mental health service use may have occurred for youth who did not in fact have mental health conditions.
- **Post-secondary** students are individuals in this report (aged 18 to 25 years) who were enrolled in publicly-funded post-secondary institutions in Alberta.
- **Post-secondary** service delivery **regions** were used for regional analyses. Dissemination areas from the 2006 Statistics Canada Census were used to determine region. Those with missing dissemination areas are excluded from analyses. There are ten regions (Northern Lakes, Keyano, Grande Prairie, Edmonton, Portage, Central, Lakeland, Calgary, Medicine Hat and Lethbridge); the boundaries for these regions are shown on the map.
- **Report population:** For this report, age groups were equated across study years. This meant that individuals over the age of 25 years were excluded from analyses by year, because no study participants were older than 25 years in the first study year.
- Socio-economic status (SES) captures the social and material environments in which individuals live. An individual was assigned a socio-economic status via an index based on the Statistics Canada dissemination area in which he or she resided<sup>5</sup>. Six indicators were included in the index: percent without a high school diploma, the employment rate, average income, percent of single families, percent of persons living alone, and percent of persons separated, divorced, or widowed. Socio-economic status values fell into five quintiles.



#### Definitions and notes (continued)

- Student Aid Alberta provides eligible students with **student loans** (Alberta and Canada) to meet their basic learning and living costs during their time as post-secondary students.
- **Students with special needs** (aged 2.5 to 19) receive special education programming services.
- **Study population:** The study included individuals with a date of birth between April 1, 1980 and March 31, 2011 and who received services from one of the programs in the study or were registered in the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan between April 1, 2005 and March 31, 2011. The youngest study participants were those born in the last study year. The oldest study participants were 25 years old at the end of the first study year and consequently 30 years old at the end of the last study year.
- **Tables** are shown by post-secondary study year.
